St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine at the World Trade Center

St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in lower Manhattan was founded in 1916 by Greek immigrants and stood as a beacon until September 11, 2001, when it was destroyed in the collapse of World Trade Center Tower 2. The small Church was the only religious house that fell during this act of terrorism. Now, the Church, which will be known as the Saint Nicholas National Shrine at Ground Zero is being resurrected on hallowed ground bearing witness to the victory of Christ over evil, death and destruction. It will unite those who believe in the power of love, hope and faith. The Philoptochos mission states that we are to "preserve and perpetuate Orthodox Christian concepts" and to "promote the Greek Orthodox Faith." Saint Nicholas will be built for all future generations, and for the many millions of people who will visit this hallowed ground in the years to come. Epistle: St. Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians 6:1-10
