Dionysios the Righteous Martyr of Vatopaidi
The Venerable Martyr Dionysios, a monk of Vatopaidi
Monastery on Mt. Athos, was sent to Crete in 1822 to escort the
Holy Girdle of the Theotokos because of an epidemic that
ravaged the island. Since at that time a revolution broke out in
Crete, the Turks arrested him as a hostage and pressured him
to convert to Islam. Because he refused, the Turks tortured him.
Remaining steadfast and unyielding in his faith he was led on
Clean Monday to the gallows, after confessing his sins and
receiving Holy Communion. On September 21, 2000, together
with other martyrs from Vatopaidi, he was inducted by a
Synodal Act of the Ecumenical Patriarchate into the list of saints
of the Church, to be commemorated on July 31st.

Joseph the Righteous of Arimathea

Saint Joseph of Arimathea was a prominent Jewish leader during the time of Jesus Christ. He is mentioned in the Gospels as being a rich man from Arimathea who was a secret disciple of Christ due to his status in the Sanhedrin. After the crucifixion and death of our Lord, Joseph approached Pontius Pilate out of piety and asked for the body of Jesus so that he might bury it honorably. He, together with Saint Nicodemus, removed the body of Christ from the cross in the presence of the Theotokos and the Myrrh-Bearing Women, wrapped it in a linen shroud, anointed it with spices, and laid it in a new tomb that he owned. This disciple later traveled the world proclaiming the Gospel until he reposed in peace in England. The Church

commemorates him individually on July 31st and along with the

Myrrh-Bearing Women and Nicodemus on the 3rd Sunday of

Pascha (the Sunday of the Holy Myrrh-Bearers).

Tomorrow begins the 15 day Fast of the Dormition of the Holy Theotokos

Epistle: St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 15:1-7


